

## 2025 Osman C. Hooper Award Winners

The annual Hooper competition, presented by the Ohio News Media Association's non-daily newspaper committee, recognizes the talents of the state's top non-daily newspaper editors, writers, photographers, designers and their colleagues.

A total of 24 non-daily newspapers from across Ohio submitted 706 entries for the 2025 Hooper awards, an increase of over 100 entries over last year. Competing newspapers were divided into two divisions based on circulation. Division A is for papers with a circulation of 2001 and above while Division B is for circulations of 2000 and below.
